School Ethos & Responsibilities Awareness of Procedures

As a school we are committed to delivering a learning environment which is accessible for any student regardless of disability or background. To do this we will deliver the following:

- To differentiate the curriculum if needed and the encouragement of full participation in the curriculum if possible
- To convey information to pupils, parents and the community in different formats if needed using Braille, larger font, coloured paper or different languages
- Plans to improve the signage in the buildings and grounds in line with reasonable costs
- Arrangements to be put in place during school events (Parents Evenings, Shows) to accommodate disabled access
- A review of this policy on a yearly basis

Equality Act 2010

The Equality Act of 2010 applies to all public bodies including schools and academies. It aims to eliminate discrimination based on all characteristics including race, disability, sex, age, religion or belief, sexual orientation, pregnancy and maternity and gender reassignment. Specific to disabled accessibility it aims to:

- Increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the curriculum.
- Improve the physical environment of schools to enable those with disabilities to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided.
- Improve the availability of accessible information to those with disabilities.

Awareness of Procedures

- Disabled access is signposted in appropriate areas
- The Accessibility Plan is shared on the school website
- For visitors it is explained upon visitor arrival
- All staff and governors have been made aware of disabled access around the school

A copy of this plan has been posted on the main noticeboard in school so that it can be read

Reasonable Adjustments

A reasonable adjustment is a change or alteration that the school could make which would enable a disabled person to access the curriculum or access the school in an easier way. Reasonable adjustments must be offset with a cost which terms them reasonable or not.

Disabled access at the front of the school.	At current there is no direct ramp down from the footpath at the front of the school to the main entrance which goes down a steep bank.	There is however a car ramp down into the main car park to a disabled space. This then would lead across flat ground to the main entrance. While this isn't ideal in the event of disabled access through the main entrance it does give a viable option to any disabled students/visitors. At no point are we suggesting that visitors within wheelchairs are to be simply driven down the road entrance. If decided as a reasonable adjustment then a ramp will be put into place on the main stair into the school.	This will be monitored by both the Headteacher and the Deputy Head as well as by the Health and Safety officer in the school. We have one student who might require access to a disabled ramp in the future however one student isn't enough to justify the installation of a ramp in addition to a staircase, especially when the road entrance is available for that student being dropped off in the morning.					
Disabled access at the rear of the school.	The rear of the school is where the doors that the students use are situated. The doors all have very short steps to the classroom entrance so this allows for disabled access through. School Disability Improvement Plan Needs and Adjustments

From the risk assessment carried out above the school is in line with most areas of what is expected. It does require intervention or investigation within:

- Hearing Impairment across the school.
- Disabled access to the rear of the school.
- Disabled access to the front of the school.

Hearing impairment: The school plans to look into this to see if any reasonable adjustments can be made. Any findings about the cost of this will be placed at the back of this plan. At current there are no hearing impairment facilities; however there are no children with hearing impairments.

Disabled access to the front of the school: Pupils can be driven into the car park and access the front entrance from there or enter from the gate nearest the park where there is a ramp. In time the school will investigate providing a ramp alongside the steps into reception however this must be at a reasonable cost.

School Complaints and Improvements Procedure

Meadowdale Academy has an internal complaints procedure which should be used in the event of a complaint regarding the disabled access to the school. We as a school also recognise that disabled children and those with SEND needs may be susceptible to bullying therefore has plans in place to counteract this.
