

Faith during spring time

As a predominantly Christian country, most of the UK celebrates **Easter** during the spring time to mark the resurrection of Jesus after his crucifixion. Each year, Easter Sunday takes place on a different date - the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox.


Passover, a holiday in the Jewish calendar, also takes place in spring. Passover celebrates the Biblical story of the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. It is tradition to eat a special bread that does not contain yeast (unleavened bread) called matzo. You must have speed on your side when making matzo as the bread begins to rise after 18 minutes!

Ramadan is celebrated by those who follow Islam and this year it's from the end of March to the end of April. Those who celebrate Ramadan practice fasting, prayer, reflection and celebrating community. Food can only be eaten after sunset or just before dawn, meaning many families create plentiful feasts to enjoy after daylight hours.






This is a fiction book and a classic love story. A beautiful young lady falls in love with someone she ought to hate. Fighting, bravery, love and hate. Will they be together?

I highly recommend this book if you're aged over 8 as it is about murder, love and hate. This book is worth reading as it's very exciting and adventurous.


There's a boy in the girls' bathroom – by Louis Sachar
