# Start times


This week our children have been able to come into school from 8.30am until 8.40am and the feedback from parents on the gates has been very positive. Reception and Year 1 use the reception green gate and Miss Dodds and Miss Thompson will be ready to welcome children there and watch them go into their classroom.

Year 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 will use the entrance that we have used when it has been pouring with rain. Straight through the yard, to the blue double doors where there will always be at least one of our Learning Support Assistants to guide children to their classrooms.

All children from Reception to Year 6 need to arrive from **8.30am - 8.40am** and will go straight to their classroom to get ready for the day of learning. We close the top gate at 8.45am when all children are registered and ready to learn. All children will need to report to the school office and if they are later than 8.45am and parents will be notified that their child was late.

### **Class Attendance**

The government expectation is 96% attendance for individual pupils and school. Attendance and punctuality really matter to your child's education - every day counts! When your child's attendance drops below 95% school will begin monitoring. Referrals to the local authority may also be made if there is no improvement seen.
